Ramah College Network Summary of Survey Results

General Demographics

Ten Ramahniks at Washington University in St. Louis responded to the survey. These students have attended one or more of the following Ramah camps and programs: Berkshires, California, Darom, New England, Nyack, Poconos, and Seminar.

The Search Process

The Impact of Ramah on the College Decision

Nearly all of the Ramahniks reported that Ramah played a role in their college decision. One student's experiences at camp directly impacted the decision to go to WashU: "when I was a camper, I saw how a lot of my counselors went out of state to college, and that was a positive model for me. Going to a good school became much more of a priority for me. Once I started working at camp, I knew of older staff members who went to the schools I was looking at. When it was time to visit schools, I went on a trip to WashU with some camp friends and stayed with camp friends once there. I came home and applied early decision." Many Ramahniks echoed this student's response: "Going to Ramah made me want to continue living a Jewish life and have Jewish friends at school."

Attributes Looked for in a School

Ramahniks who attend WashU looked for a smaller school in a medium-sized city, academic options with a flexible curriculum, and diverse campus. Many students were looking for a strong Jewish community, which included a good Hillel rabbi, availability of kosher food, and a Shabbat community.

Best Aspects of the School

Many Ramahniks noted the size of the school is one of its best aspects; it's small enough to find a community, but large enough to encourage diversity. Many students wrote about the academic aspect of WashU: "the faculty is really accommodating, and being a medium size school as a student you feel important, and not just another member of the herd." In regards to the Jewish community, one student wrote: "the school has many Jewish resources, but the community is not denominationally divided." It is definitely highly academic, but it doesn't feel cut-throat. Students here want to enjoy themselves.

Jewish Life on Campus

Kosher Dining Options

There is kosher food available on WashU's campus. There isn't a specific kosher mealplan, however there are many different options for kosher and vegetarian food. On the South 40 (where underclassmen live), there is a kosher station that serves a hot lunch and hot dinner Sunday-Thursday. Pre-packs (pre-packaged foods) are available all over main campus as well as the 40, and include the leftovers of the previous night's hot dinner. Additionally, Chabad offers Shabbat dinner every week. Hillel is in the process of renovating its facilities and will have more extensive dining options beginning in fall 2013. Students were generally satisfied with the kosher options, noting that it is easily accessible. Even when hot kosher food isn't available (as is the case on main campus and in the Village, upperclassman housing) the vegetarian options are always extensive and delicious (WashU is known for having the best food!). However, choices are limited: "People keeping kosher in the strictest sense may find their options just a bit limited." Students would prefer if there were more hot meals available.

Worship/Services

Students at WashU have the option of attending services at the Hillel House as well as at local synagogues. Service options include Conservative, Orthodox, Reform, Chabad, and Reconstructionist. Students estimate that around 60 students attend services on Friday night, and on Saturday morning a number of students attend local synagogues, in addition to a new weekly Conservative morning minyan. Students are very satisfied with services, both at Hillel and at local synagogues. One student explained: "Good community between observant students means that you get to meet other denominations also." Another Ramahnik commented: "I am happy that we have a monthly Shabbat Mincha, Ma'ariv, and Seudah Sh'lishit." In addition to Shabbat services, Hillel offers a daily nonegalitarian, as well as a weekly weekday egalitarian minyan.

Jewish Studies

Ramahniks at WashU expressed satisfaction with the Jewish studies offerings. They recommended all Modern Hebrew courses, Jewish History courses, The Jews in Christian Europe, Jews in the Middle East, Intro to Jewish Civilization, and any course taught by Pamela Barmash.

Jewish Social Life

In addition to Hillel, there is a Jewish Student Union that sponsors programs. Students note that the Jewish community is very active, in part because there are "no barriers between Orthodox/Conservative/Reform" students. Additionally, many Jewish students are active in Greek life. As one student noted, "the nice thing about WashU is that so many people are Jewish that aren't necessarily involved in 'the Jewish community' that a lot of your friends will be Jewish anyway." The main struggle for a "Jewish social life" is that Greek life has so many Jews, that many students don't feel like they need to find another social outlet to make Jewish friends since they already have so many. Hillel and Chabad are both working to grow their organizations to better reach out to Jewish students in Greek life that are otherwise not involved in Jewish life on campus.

Hillel Activities

WashU's Hillel offers religious services, social programs, Israel programming, study opportunities, social action opportunities, holiday and Shabbat meals and programming, and concerts. Rabbi Andy Kastner is very approachable and takes a genuine interest in getting to know the student body, not just the "involved" Jewish students. WashU students tend to be very overcommitted, so often Hillel events compete with a host of other activities on campus. Of those who responded to the survey, three Ramahniks have held leadership positions in Hillel, and one has held a leadership position in KOACH. Most of the respondents have never attended KOACH programming at WashU.

Other Options for Jewish Social Life

Chabad is one of the main sources of Jewish social life outside of Hillel. The Chabad Student Association, a student-run board is very active and brings in large numbers of students to their events. Shabbat dinners always have at least 120 people. Many students also attend the local Modern Orthodox synagogue, which is close to campus; local synagogues are very welcoming to students.

Antisemitism and Anti-Israel Activity on Campus

None of the students reported seeing antisemitism on campus; one student wrote: "I've encountered confused people, but no antisemites." There is little anti-Israel activity at WashU. One student explains, "The last anti-Israel activity happened 4 years ago, when the now-defunct pro-Palestinian group made a wall to protest the barrier. They had a few protesters and a lot of counter-protesters, and then a few weeks later they offered the wall to our Israel group (WSI - WashU Students for Israel) to use for Yom Ha'Atzmaut as part of the Kotel. That says a lot about WashU students."

Ramahniks' Advice to Prospective Students

Ramahniks at Washington University in St. Louis encourage prospective students to apply early and be persistent if you are placed on the waiting list. Take advantage of what WashU has to offer.

"The best thing about WashU is the people. Everyone wants you to succeed, from the barista who told me not to stay up too late after I ordered a latte, to the professors who invite you to walk into office hours and debate with them. WashU students are really smart and hard-working, but they're also super nice and down to earth."

"I'd sum up the benefit of the WashU Jewish community by saying that we have the resources of nearly any school in the country, but almost none of the denominational divisiveness of many other schools."

"It's a fantastic school - definitely go here! But also consider that the classes are challenging and there are high academic expectations. There is great campus involvement, but if you're looking for a city life, this isn't it. Weather's okay, beautiful campus, and people are happy here."

"Apply early if you want to go here!"

"Make sure it feels right- not that it's the best academically, socially, athletically etc. Make sure it feels right to you, because the only way to know if you're going to enjoy it is how good you feel on the campus, doing the things you want to do."
